**Report by Group Manager, Community and Corporate**

**Introduction**

The Council has on its register a resolution from 2004:

*“That Council install an information plaque at the place of the former home of the Late Eve Langley, Clydebank Rd Katoomba to acknowledge the literary value of her work and her contribution as a member of the community.”*

(Minute No. 82, 09/03/04)

This report presents results of staff efforts to implement this resolution.

**Background**

The novelist, Eve Langley was born on 1 September 1904 in Forbes, New South Wales. Langley lived her remaining years in an isolated hut “Iona Lympus” in Katoomba, where she died in June 1974. Langley is buried in Katoomba cemetery.

Langley first made a name for herself as a writer in New Zealand in the 1930s where her poetry was regularly published in magazines. Her journalism and short stories were also published in the 1930s, 1940s and 1950s. Langley wrote consistently throughout her life and had two novels published *The Pea-Pickers* in 1942 and *White Topee* in 1954.

**Assessment of Options**

In 2007 Council Officers visited the site of Eve Langley’s former home in Clydebank Rd Katoomba to determine the suitability of the site for installing a plaque honoring Langley. They deemed the site unsuitable due to the following reasons:

- There is no longer a dwelling defining the location of Langley’s former home.
- The site is very isolated and not readily accessible to the public.

In December 2007 Council Officers met with Peter Bishop, Creative Director of Varuna Writers Centre, to discuss the possibilities of a plaque being erected at Varuna. The following option was put forward by Varuna:

- A Memorial Garden could be built at Varuna to honour Blue Mountains literary figures.
- Varuna does not have the funds to build a Memorial Garden.
- Varuna does not have funds to purchase a plaque for Eve Langley or for future honorary plaques honoring other local writers.

In summary, Varuna indicated that they were not interested in placing a plaque for only one writer and that they would need to be funded to establish the proposed literary Memorial Garden. There is currently no budget allocated for the creation of a plaque or a Memorial Garden.

Council Officers have considered the possibility of placing a plaque recognizing Eve Langley in the Katoomba Library. Because of space limitations and lack of budget this is not recommended in the current library. However, it might be possible for the work of Eve Langley, and possibly other prominent writers, to be recognized in some way at the new Katoomba Library. It is recommended that this possible idea be referred to the Katoomba Library Reference Group for their consideration.

**Financial implications for the Council**

No budget has been allocated for the development and/ or installation of a plaque honouring Eve Langley.

**Legal and risk management issues for the Council**

There are no legal and risk management issues to note.

**Conclusion**

It is recommended that the Council not pursue its original resolution at this time. However, the possibility of recognising Eve Langley in some way in the new Katoomba Library (due to be completed in 2011) is recommended for possible consideration/ investigation, with final determination on this matter to be delegated to the General Manager.

**Report by Group Manager, Community and Corporate:****Introduction**

The Department of Community Services (DoCS) has agreed to provide funds for 2008/2009 totalling \$43,077 to Blue Mountains City Council to subsidise three positions in the Community Outcomes Team and Family Day Care's Blackheath Vacation Care program. The Council Common Seal is required to be affixed to the Service Agreements to enable the release of this funding for 2008/2009.

Funding is being provided by the DoCS for the following positions and programs:

1. Social Planner: Sustainable Community: \$12,713
2. Children's Services Development Officer: \$12,714
3. Youth Services Development Officer: \$12,715
4. Blackheath Vacation Care: \$4,935

The objectives of these grants form part of the individual business plans for each identified position.

**Background**

The Community Development positions, towards which the DoCS contributes funding, are pivotal in supporting the Council's planning, coordination and implementation of community development outcomes. This work is fundamental to achieving Key Direction 2 – Looking After People, in the Council's Map for Action.

Key directions for each position are detailed below:

**1. Social Planner- Sustainable Community:**

This position leads the Council's work on the implementation of 2007 Blue Mountains Community Plan and supports and ensures continued emphasis on a planned approach to the provision of needed community services and facilities across the Blue Mountains.

**2. Children and Family Services Development Officer:**

The Children and Family Services Development Officer assists the development and coordination of children and family services. The position provides a support and resourcing role to services for children and families in the Blue Mountains.

**3. Youth Services Development Officer:**

The Youth Services Development Officer assists the development and coordination of appropriate services and facilities for young people. The position provides a resourcing role to youth specific services in the Blue Mountains.

**4. Blackheath Vacation Care:**

Blackheath Vacation Care service operates for 10 weeks each year during school vacation periods. The service cares for primary school aged children although children outside this age range who have special needs or who are in emergency situations can also be cared for. The service program includes supervised play and recreational activities designed to meet the children's social, emotional, creative and physical development needs. The service aims to promote equality of opportunity in access to care irrespective of family income, cultural or linguistic background, child or parental disability. Blackheath Vacation Care meets the necessary quality standards and is accredited by the National Childcare Accreditation Council.

**Sustainability Assessment**

The DoCS Grants Program has positive social and economic benefits for both the Council and the community of the Blue Mountains. The grants assist the Council's Community Development staff to deliver the actions outlined in Key Direction 2 of the Council's Map for Action – Looking After People.

DoCS is the main State Government body responsible for delivering Community Services across the State. This partnership program allows the Council to participate in the development of services within the Blue Mountains Local Government Area.

**Financial Implications**

This Grants Program is a longstanding partnership agreement between DoCS and the Council of the City of Blue Mountains and financially it contributes to the cost of employing three Community Development workers and supporting the Blackheath Vacation Care program..

**Legal and Risk Management Issues**

There are no legal or risk management issues associated.

**External Consultation**

The Council has had consultations with the DoCS Community Program Officer for the Blue Mountains area.

**Conclusion**

The Department of Community Services has been contributing towards Blackheath Vacation Care and the cost of employing these Community Development positions for a number of years. These positions are of significant benefit to the community and the funding is important to achieving the Council's Community Development outcomes. It is recommended that the Council of the City of Blue Mountains endorse the 2008/2009 Service Agreements

and that the Common Seal of the Council of the City of Blue Mountains be affixed to the relevant documentation.

**Recommendations:**

  2. *That all recipients of Community Donations be required to submit an annual report on expenditure of funds and project outcomes.*

**Report by Group Manager, Community & Corporate:****Background**

The Council's Community Donations Advisory Committee met on the 27<sup>th</sup> of May 2008 to consider applications from local community organisations and groups. The committee was comprised of Councillors Terri Hamilton, Chris Van Der Kley and Lyn Trindall. Councillor Fiona Creed was unable to attend the meeting but did review the applications and provided input into the recommendations of the Advisory Committee.

This report presents the funding recommendations of the Advisory Committee to the Council for consideration.

**Funding**

Funds available for local community organisations through the 2007/2008 Community Donations Program total \$49,940. From this total an amount of \$2,500 has already been distributed to the Blue Mountains Family Support Service and to the Lower Mountains Family Support Service to contribute to their Christmas emergency food relief funds. An allocation of \$5,000 has been made to the Blue Mountains City Band. These allocations have been made in line with the Council's Resolution Minute No.627 at its Ordinary Meeting held on the 8th December 1998.

This leaves \$39,940 available to support local community organisations through the Community Donations Program in the annual funding round 2007/2008.

**Criteria for Selection**

The applications were assessed against the Council's adopted criteria for Community Donations as per Minute No.78, 3 April 2007, as outlined in Attachment 1.

**Assessment of Funding Requests**

2007/2008 Community Donations applications have been assessed against the Council's donations funding criteria. The following Access and Equity activities or strategies guided the Advisory Committee's application of the above assessment criteria to the Council.

Access and Equity activities or strategies are those that benefit both the broad community and/or particular target groups and help to:

- Promote fairness in the distribution of resources, particularly for those most in need;
- Recognise and promote people's rights and improve the accountability of decision makers;
- Ensure people have fairer access to the resources and services essential to meeting their needs and improving their quality of life;
- Give people better opportunities for genuine participation and consultation about decisions affecting their lives.

### Overview of Community Donations Requests

A total of 55 applications were received, requesting Community Donations totalling \$42,356. Of these, 29 applications were for projects or activities with a citywide focus as distinct from an Area focus (see Table 1).

Of the 55 applications received the Advisory Committee has recommended a total of 52 projects for funding totalling \$39,900.

In recognition of the valuable work these community organisations provide to the well-being and vitality of our community the committee resolved that a number of organisations receive a higher than requested allocation. These higher allocations were met within the existing budget.

Attachment 2 provides a summary of the applications received and the funding recommended by the Community Donations Advisory Committee.

**Key Organisation Status**

As outlined in the Community Donations Guidelines (see Attachment 1 section 2.9), there are two levels of funding that have been designated for “Key Community Groups: Level 1 where the Group receives up to \$1,500 and Level 2 where the Group receives up to \$750.

Requests were received from the Upper Blue Mountains Child Protection Service Inc. (The Gunedoo Centre) and the Mountains Youth Services Team (MYST) regarding their designation as Level 1 or 2 Key Community Groups.

The Gunedoo Centre requested the Committee consider their appointment to Level 1 or Level 2 status. The Committee recommends to the Council that the current program does not have the funding capacity to appoint further Level 1 or Level 2 Key Organisations. However, the Gunedoo Centre is being recommended to receive the full amount of \$750 in this funding round.

The Mountains Youth Services Team (MYST) requested an adjustment in future funding levels, due to the amalgamation of MYST, Mountains Youth Resource Organisation (MYRO) and Upper Mountains Youth Service (UMYS). MYST will assume responsibility for these organisations in 2008/2009. MYST are currently designated as a Level 1 key organisation with a potential allocation of \$1,500, MYRO and UMYS are Level 2 key organisations with a potential allocation of \$750 to each. MYST have requested this funding be combined in future funding rounds allowing a total allocation of \$3,000. The Advisory Committee recommends to the Council that future allocations to MYST will remain at the Level 1 status of \$1,500.

The Advisory Committee also recommends that as the Mountains Youth Resource Organisation (MYRO) has not been functioning recently, it not be funded in this donation round.

**Reporting Requirements**

All organisations re-applying in the 2007/2008 round of the Community Donations Program have fulfilled their obligation under item 5.1 of the Community Donations Guidelines by submitting a report on the expenditure of the community donation received in the 2006/2007 round.

The Advisory Committee recommends that the Blue Mountains Family Support Service, the Upper Mountains Family Support Service and the Blue Mountains City Band, all receiving allocations in line with Council’s Resolution Minute No.627 (Ordinary Meeting 8/12/98), should also be required to submit a report on the expenditure of the community donations received.

**Financial Implications**

The Community Donations Program has allocated funding of \$50,400 in the 2007/2008 Budget to cover the recommendations as detailed in Attachment 2.

**Legal and Risk Management Issues**

There are no legal and risk management issues to note.

**Consultation**

Requests for funding were called for over a five week period from 2 April 2008 to 7 May 2008. The program was advertised in the Blue Mountains Gazette on 9 April and 16 April 2008.

**Conclusion**

The projects and the recommendations of the Community Donations Advisory Committee are detailed in Attachment 2. These projects and the work and activities of these community organisations will bring numerous benefits to residents of the Blue Mountains. The Community Donations Program is an important contribution to and acknowledgement by the Council of the important role played by the community sector to improving the quality of life and wellbeing of residents of the Blue Mountains.

It is recommended that the Council, as authorised by Section 356 (1) of the Local Government Act 1993, grant financial assistance to the community organisations as recommended by the Advisory Committee in Attachment 2.

## Community Donations Guidelines

**1. OBJECTIVE**

The Blue Mountains City Council distributes funds under the Community Donations Program to not for profit community organisations. The Program recognises the contribution that community organisations make to the quality of life and well being of the local community. The program assists community organisations to provide a diverse range of activities and services to local residents. The Council's contribution to these community organisations builds on and develops their capacity to provide local activities and services.

**2. FUNDING CRITERIA**

So that funding is allocated in the most equitable and effective way possible, the following criteria apply:

- 2.1 Not for profit, incorporated organisations can only submit one application per year except as detailed in clause 2.2 of the Community Donations Guidelines.
- 2.2 Not for profit, incorporated organisations, holding an ABN, are eligible to apply for one community donation in each funding round. Organisations identified as Level 1 or Level 2 Key Community Organisations as detailed in clause 2.9, may submit an application for multiple projects up to their funding cap. These should be detailed on the one application form. This clause also relates to the auspicing of proposals of unincorporated organisations by Level 1 and Level 2 key organisations.
- 2.3 All not for profit organisations applying for a Community Donation must be incorporated and hold a valid ABN. If the organisation is auspiced, the auspicing organisation must also be incorporated and hold a valid ABN. If successful in receiving funds under this program, payment will be made to the entity name registered to the ABN.
- 2.4 Applications must address the objectives of the program and comply with the Community Donations Guidelines.
- 2.5 Proposals that address Access and Equity principles will be given priority.
- 2.6 Applications for funding must be for specific projects and activities and or/equipment.
- 2.7 Funding must be expended within twelve (12) months from the time the successful applicants have been notified.
- 2.8 The following organisations are eligible and ineligible for funding:

- 2.9 The following have been designated as Key Community Organisations and must submit a detailed application to be eligible for the following funding.

- 2.10 Blue Mountains City Band is eligible to apply for a community donation of \$5,000 and are ineligible to submit another application through this program.
- 2.11 Blue Mountains Family Support Service and Lower Mountains Family Service each are eligible to apply for \$2,500 to support their Christmas Emergency Relief Programs. In addition these organisations are eligible to apply for \$750 through the annual Community Donations Funding Round.
- 2.12 Most donations will be in the range of \$200 - \$500 with \$750 being the maximum amount. This excludes the organisations listed above as key organisations Level 1 which are eligible to apply for up to \$1,500.
- 2.13 All funding awarded by the Council is made on the assumption of honest and full disclosure of information. Evidence of any breach of this trust will make the donation null and void in which case any funds paid under the Community Donations Program may be returned to the Council.

### 3. PROCEDURES

---

- 3.1 An application form must be completed each year, including by Key Community Organisations.
- 3.2 If a group wishing to apply for funding is NOT incorporated, it MUST be auspiced by an incorporated organisation on its behalf.
- 3.3 Applications WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED if:
  - 3.3.1 Application form is not completed in full
  - 3.3.2 Not submitted on the correct application form
  - 3.3.3 Received LATER than the closing date
  - 3.3.4 The Organisation does not hold an ABN.
- 3.4 Closing date for submission of applications for the 2008 Community Donations Funding Round is 5pm on 7 May 2008.
- 3.5 Applications should be submitted to the Blue Mountains City Council offices at Katoomba or Springwood; or via mail to Locked Bag 1005, Katoomba NSW 2780 by the closing date.
- 3.6 Please contact Council officers should you have any questions regarding the completion of this form.

### 4. EVALUATION PROCESS

---

This funding evaluation process will be adhered to:

- 4.1 All information provided will be treated as confidential.
- 4.2 Applications will initially be processed for eligibility in accordance with these guidelines.
- 4.3 The Council's Community Donations Advisory Committee will consider applications and make recommendations to the Council.
- 4.4 A report will be submitted to the Council with the recommendations of the Community Donations Advisory Committee for its determination.

### 5. FUNDING AGREEMENTS AND ACCOUNTABILITY

---

- 5.1 All projects successful in receiving funding will be required to submit a report on the expenditure of the community donation. This report is required before an organisation is able to apply for subsequent funding under the BMCC Community Donations Program.

**Report by Group Manager, BM City Services:****Introduction**

The Blue Mountains City Council Family Day Care Service (BMFDCS) provides quality childcare services for young children who are cared for by registered Carers. The Service is partially funded by the Federal Government and is licensed by the NSW Department of Community Services (DOCs). The Council has received from the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations (DEEWR) a formal offer of grant funding for the 2008-2009 financial year, along with the Long Form Funding Agreement detailing terms and conditions for the provision of the service. The Agreement has been reviewed and with the exception of a variation to the basis of calculating payment, is consistent with previous Agreements entered into by the Council.

**Background**

The Blue Mountains Family Day Care Service supports and administers a network of Family Day Care carers who provide flexible early childhood education and child care in their own homes for other people's children. The Federal Government provides financial support for the Family Day Care Service under the Child Care Services Support Program. This funding contributes toward meeting the costs of delivering a high quality Family Day Care service assisting families with dependent children to participate in the workforce and general community.

**Conditions of Funding Agreement**

The level of funding is calculated on the basis of Utilisation and Activity Reports submitted by BMFDCS to DEEWR. The method of calculation is set out in the Family Day Care Program Guidelines and the amounts are subject to indexation. The Payment Schedule within the guidelines provides for quarterly payments and for the 2008-2009 financial year these dates are: 14<sup>th</sup> July 2008, 14<sup>th</sup> October 2008, 14<sup>th</sup> January 2009 and 14<sup>th</sup> April 2009.

A final Audited Acquittal Report is required to be submitted to DEEWR in October 2009.

**Acceptance of Funding Offer**

Formal acceptance of the funding offer is through the signing of the Long Form Funding Agreement by authorised representatives of the Council.

**Financial Implications**

Changes introduced in 2007-2008 that had the effect of reducing the level of FDC grant funding have now been accommodated within the BMFDCS budgets. However the Commonwealth of Australia funding of BMFDCS still subsidises a significant portion of overall operational costs and is critical to the scheme’s ongoing financial sustainability. The structure of the funding agreement received differs from that in previous years in that funding is based on actual participation levels as reported by BMFDCS to DEEWR. The level of funding anticipated under the agreement is however consistent with budget forecasts.

**Conclusion/Recommendations**

It is recommended that Council accepts the conditions of funding and that the Common Seal of Council is affixed to the two copies of the Funding Agreement representing the period 1<sup>st</sup> July 2008 to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2009.

**Recommendations:**

1. *That the Council receive and note this report.*
  2. *That the Council write to the Blue Mountains Musical Society, confirming previous advice that the Council does not currently have any suitable storage facilities available.*
  3. *That the Council advise the Blue Mountains Musical Society of the community facilities being acquired, the likely timing of their availability to the community, and in accordance with the Community Buildings Policy, the process that will need to be followed to apply to occupy these buildings.*

**Report by Group Manager, Community & Corporate:****Background**

In September 2007 the Blue Mountains Musical Society (BMMS) approached the Council, requesting discussion on the options for the improvement of storage facilities for the BMMS.

Discussions were held with the BMMS in October 2007 and again in December 2007 regarding the matter. The BMMS was advised that regrettably the Council does not have any suitable facilities currently available for their use.

At the Council meeting of 11 March 2008, it was resolved:

*"That a report come to the Council on possible options for assisting the Blue Mountains Musical Society with costume storage."*

(Minute No. 437, 11/03/08)

**Report**

It is understood the Blue Mountains Musical Society currently has three storage facilities, none of which are Council owned:

- Greenway Lane, Springwood (privately leased).
- Scrivenor Lane, Springwood (privately leased).
- Lawson Road, Springwood (storage container on road reserve outside Springwood Council Depot – there is not room for this facility to expanded).

A number of suggestions have been investigated to determine if the needs of BMMS could be met:

- *The placement of storage containers at Springwood Depot.* This is not considered suitable, as it would raise a number of security problems in regard to access by non-council staff to the depot, as well as OH&S issues with unauthorised persons accessing the site.
- *The use of the Faulconbridge Church Hall at 585 Great Western Highway, Faulconbridge, which the Council is in the process of acquiring.* This is not considered suitable for storage only, as the LEP Zoning of Living General applicable to the property, does not permit stand alone storage facilities as the primary purpose for occupation.
- *The use of the Integral Energy Building at Springwood Avenue, Springwood, which the Council is in the process of acquiring.* This is not considered suitable for storage only, as the LEP Zoning of Village Housing applicable to the property, does not permit stand alone storage facilities.
- *The use of the Old Scout Hall at Fairy Dell Reserve, Springwood Avenue, Springwood.* The Council resolved on 10th June 2003 (Min 220) to demolish this building. Recent advice is a Plan of Management may be required prior to demolishing this building which is on Community Land. There is no current Plan of Management for this site. In addition to this resolution of Council, there are major access constraints, lack of passive surveillance and the LEP Zoning of Recreation – Environmental Protection does not permit stand alone storage facilities.
- *Renting of commercial storage facilities has also been investigated.* A standard garage sized facility (6.0m x 2.7m) in either the Blue Mountains or Penrith, ranges in cost from \$260/month to \$340/month (\$3,120 - \$4,080 / per annum). There is no allowance in the current or proposed Council budgets for such costs, particularly given the ongoing nature of the expense.

Storage within community buildings is generally permissible if the storage use is ancillary to the primary approved use of the facility. In this light the use of a building such as the Faulconbridge Church Hall or Old Scout Hall at Fairy Dell as a community building, may provide some storage for the user group, if the building was used primarily for a purpose defined in LEP2005 as a 'Community Building'. Community Buildings are those owned by the Council or under the management, care and control of the Council, and used for community purposes. Such uses include a meeting room, club room or exhibition space.

Underlying the request from the Blue Mountains Musical Society is the question of the Council's involvement in their need for storage facilities. While the contribution of the Blue Mountains Musical Society to the cultural richness of the Blue Mountains Community is well recognised, there are many worthwhile community organisations including sporting groups that regularly seek the assistance of the Council in providing storage space for their resources and equipment. Many of these requests cannot be fulfilled by the Council.

#### **Process for Community Groups to Occupy a Community Facility.**

The Community Buildings Policy requires the Council to call for expressions of interest from the community for the use of the facility, such as when a community building becomes vacant (as is the case with the Old Scout Hall at Fairy Dell), or is newly acquired (as will be the case with the Faulconbridge Church Hall and Integral Energy Building), Submissions are assessed

on their merits by the Premises Review Panel, and the recommendations of the Panel are reported to the Council for determination.

**Financial Implications**

The cost of hiring or providing purpose built storage facilities for the BMMS is considered cost prohibitive at this time for the Council. The Council is in the process of acquiring other community buildings which may provide some storage options for community groups that may be more cost effective for the Council. The use and management arrangements of these buildings will be the subject of future Council reports.

**Conclusion**

All possible Council owned resources have been considered in an effort to assist the Blue Mountains Musical Society with their storage needs, however, the Council does not currently have available any suitable facilities for the use of community groups for storage. The Community Buildings referred to above may however be available in the future, for use by community organisations. This will not be until such time as the Council completes the acquisition of the properties, may need an a Plan of Management for each of the site, and conducts the Expression of Interest process for each of the facilities.
